

Developing Independent Living Skills

Age 3

Caregivers can help children develop independent living skills at any age. Self-care, home, and community living skills can be graded and adapted to meet your child's specific needs and ability level. The following chart describes activities that your child should be able to do at their developmental age level.

Dressing Skills

Takes off a pull on t-shirt or sweatshirt

Puts on pull on t-shirt or sweatshirt

Puts on a jacket (excluding fasteners)

Takes off elastic walst pants or shorts

Puts on elastic waist pants or shorts

Takes off socks

Puts on socks

Takes off shoes

Puts on and fastens Velcro or elastic-laced shoes

Puts on underwear

Takes off underwear

Obtains clothing from storage area

Feeding Skills

Eats all textures of table food (pureed, soft, chewy, crunchy)

Eats mixed textured foods (casseroles, fruit and yogurt)

Eats foods from all food groups

Finger feeds self

Scoops with a spoon or fork and brings to mouth

Uses spoon well

Uses fork well

Drinks from a regular cup well

Can use a straw for drinking well

Gets onto and off of kitchen chairs safely

Other Functional Mobility Skills

Gets into and out of bed safely

Gets on/off of soft furniture safely (living room chair, couch)

Obtains all items for leisure or play

Accesses floor (gets onto and off of ground safely)

Transports items for personal use in the home

Obtains ready to eat items from kitchen or pantry

Gets into and out of vehicle safely

Toileting Skills

Indicates when wet/soiled

Has bowel/bladder control during the day

Has bowel/bladder control at night and at times of rest

Indicates when needs to use bathroom

Takes self to the bathroom for urination and bowel movements

Gets onto and off of toilet safely

Obtains and able to us necessary supplies

Maintains safe body position while toileting (not a fall risk)

Manages clothing

Completes toileting sequence including toileting, flushing,

and hand washing

Hygiene and Grooming Skills

Accesses sink and obtains all grooming supplies

Washes, rinses, and dries hands well

Spits out toothpaste

Tolerates haircuts/trims

Gets into/out of bath or shower safely

Maintains a safe body position while bathing or showering (not a fall risk)

Housework/Chores

Picks up belongings or toys with adult assistance

Picks up belongings or toys when asked

Safety Skills

Notifies adult when injured or hurt
